New Voting Laws in Effect Ahead of November's Special Election



Michigan voters passed Proposal 2 in November 2022 and as a result expanded voting options to include a Permanent Mail Ballot List. additional secure drop boxes, and nine days of early voting. These three changes are on schedule to be in place for a special election on Tuesday, November 7, 2023, when Bloomfield Township voters who reside within the Bloomfield Hills School District will consider the passage of a building and site sinking fund millage renewal proposal.

The Permanent Mail Ballot List is different than the Permanent Absentee Voter Application List you may already be on, which only mails an application for an absentee ballot. This new list will mail you an absentee ballot for each election to the address on your voter file. To join the Permanent Mail Ballot List, fill out the form found on the Elections Q/A page of the Township website. The Clerk's Office intends to keep the Permanent Absentee Voter Application list for a transition period through 2024 unless otherwise required by law or instruction from the Secretary of State. There is a Frequently Asked Questions section of the website devoted to this issue, or you may direct questions to the Clerk's Office. To be installed in the coming

days are two new secure elections drop boxes. One is located on Westview Road by the Fire Station at Eastview Elementary School, I 101 Westview Road, and another at Bloomfield Village Hall, 3595 Bradway Blvd., near the intersection of Maple and Lahser Roads. There will continue to be a drop box located at Township Hall, 4200 Telegraph, as in previous elections.

Additionally, we are planning for nine days of early voting for this November, which will occur at the Bloomfield Township Public Library for voters in Bloomfield Township, Southfield Township, and Birmingham. The dates and times are TBD, but will be shared on Township News. eNewsletter, and social media channels as decisions occur. If the State and County cannot prepare early voting procedures in time for November, early voting will instead start with the 2024 Presidential Primary election.

With increased voter access comes increased security measures. There is enhanced secure storage of absentee voter ballots awaiting counting and tightened chain of custody documentation for these same allots. All election workers will now undergo criminal background checks. Finally, extra verification methods for voter registration status were implemented to do our part to ensure the registration list remains as up-to-date as possible. We look forward to seeing you at the polls or the Clerk's Office this

election season.

Vacancy on the Township Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees has accepted the resignation of Treasurer Brian Kepes (effective August 31,

2023 at 5:30 p.m.) and voted to appoint Trustee Michael Schostak as Treasurer effective immediately at that time. The Board is seeking a qualified candidate to fill this Trustee vacancy for a term of office that expires in November 2024.

The legal minimum qualifications require that you have resided in Bloomfield Township for no less than 30 days, you are at least 18

years of age and that you are registered to vote in the

To be considered by the Township Board, you must meet the minimum qualifications, and timely submit a letter of interest, a current resume, and written responses to a series of questions compiled by Board members. The list of questions can be found on the Township website. The application items

must be received by the Township Clerk's Office no later than 5:30 p.m. on Wednesday, September 20, 2023. Applicants are invited to

Tuesday, September 26th to address the Board for up to three minutes concerning their application. A verbal statement at this meeting is encouraged, but not required. The Board will review and consider information from all applicants and select a person to appoint.

Fall Happenings and Priority Waste Transition Update



As the days get shorter, the nights get cooler, college football returns, and the leaves change colors, we are reminded that summer is coming to a close and fall is upon us. One highlight of fall that I'm excited to bring back is the Township Open House. After a 5-year hiatus, we will be hosting the community on Sunday, October 1st for a day filled with fun, food, activities and information about services available to residents. In addition to the Township departments, we will also be highlighting our partners in the community such as Charles Bower School Farm, E.L. Johnson Nature Center, Township Library, Oakland County Parks & Rec, Oakland County Health Department, the Rotary Club, and more. Please join us, as we bring the community together to celebrate what makes Bloomfield Township special!

In addition to celebrating the Township services this fall, we also can highlight the transition that happened this past summer by switching the solid waste provider to residents. Although it is typical to change providers often, typically every 6–8 years here in Bloomfield, it isn't a choice that is taken lightly. You have likely seen the problems GFL is having in Canton Township where the compost services halted

Monday-Friday throughout summer and with the City of Dearborn currently using DPW staff to pick up trash on weekends. These are just some of the things we feared looming ahead for Bloomfield when we decided to put the contract out for bid. Luckily, we were able to find a new provider, Priority Waste, that provides desired partnership style relationship with accountability in customer service, and a desire to continuously improve.

Solid waste removal is one of the only services that touches every single household every week, and yet this very personal service has to be provided by a third party. Consideringthereareapproximately 16,000 accounts, and that account information was not handed over in time from GFL, we were thankful Priority Waste proactively reached out to residents to create account information and practiced routes for weeks prior to the start in preparation for transition. Since accounts have 3 services including garbage, recycling, and compost, that equates to over 51,000 touches with our residents, meaning 51,000 possible mistakes every single week. It was amazing to see that during the 5 week transition, there were only 235 reported errors out of a

total of 258,225 service touches.

I asked the Priority Executive team some questions about the transition. Follow along on the next page for actual data provided to show trends from week I to week 5, covering July 3rd – August 5th. It is great to see that in addition to weekly ticket counts going down, the time it takes to complete the routes has been reduced as well. Thank you to all of you for your grace & patience during the transition to change over every single residence, approximately 16,000 to the new service. It wasn't an easy task, but together we made it through. Q&A with Dani Walsh and Priority Waste

Dani Walsh (DW) - With over 16,000 accounts, what is the total # of "touches/stops" that Priority does in the Township, per week?

Priority Waste (PW) -

Residential – 51,645 weekly touches (garbage, recycling, compost)

Dumpsters - 91 weekly touches


DW - How many issues/errors/ complaints did you have – week to week? Also, please explain what defines an issue/error/complaint.

PW - 235 total service tickets were entered into the portal over 5 weeks.

That's a 99.7% Success Rate

A ticket is created for every service inquiry requiring action. Below is a breakdown of the categories:

- Missed stop (Trash) 118
- Missed Stop (Recycle) 41
- Missed Stop (Compost) 22
- Other 22
- Bulk 17
- Complaint 9
- Education 3
- I bulk education on proper placement and preparing for collection
- 2 education on late set materials
- Late Set Out 2




42% Improvement from Peak to Current

There has been a constant flow of communication between the residents and officials of Bloomfield Township

and our Bloomfield Township dedicated LDC (Logistic Driver Coordinators) team, throughout the transition. We noticed based on the numbers a spike in portal entries/tickets in the second week. Corrective action analysis determined routing errors that stemmed from improper adjustments made in the first week's service. We evaluated the routing and corrected errors identified which led to a 42% and 46% decrease in calls over the next two weeks.

DW - How has your end-time from week to week been improving? PW - We are experiencing a positive trend in productivity week over week. As our drivers learn their assigned routes and become more familiar with the area, they are much more efficient. Additionally, the LDC's for Bloomfield Township have been a reliable resource to troubleshoot the problem areas discovered over the first 5 weeks. Most of the route adjustments came from in-field feedback and experience. The Bloomfield Township LDC's also played a critical role improving the service efficiencies that the residents are experiencing. Route completion time has improved 25% from day I, down to 8 hours from 11.



Week I to Week 5

DW - What feedback from the Twp or its residents has resulted in process improvements? What ways have you been responsive to the Township's unique needs/wants?

PW - Priority has received a great deal of information from the Township employees and the residents that have been acted on throughout the initial 5 weeks of service. Having a culture of being open to suggestions is what enables us to continually improve as a collaborative service partner.

- We have increased the houses serviced by the smaller truck to accommodate areas that are difficult to navigate.
- Tight roadways, narrow paths, small bridges, etc.
- Implemented a hotlist of service requests that residents have brought to us. We are accommodating those requests that are within reason as much as possible.

DW - How many 95-gallon carts were ordered by Twp residents by week 5? How many have been delivered so far? PW - 216 95-gallon trash carts have been ordered by Bloomfield Township residents. 144 95-gallon trash carts have been delivered with the remaining 72 to be delivered next week. (Data reflects information up to Thursday, August 3, 2023)

PW - Number of Phone Calls - 1.064

Average Call Length – 2:07 Minutes Average Hold Time – 0:22 Seconds
