




Patrol Division

PATROL DISTRICTS



The Patrol Division is staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Bloomfield Township is divided into three "districts" or patrol areas. These districts are staffed every shift to provide the quickest response times. These districts are complimented by additional staffing from specialty units that are not assigned to districts and focus on selective enforcement areas (i.e. speeding, break-ins, etc.).



PATROL DIVISION



The Patrol Division is comprised of 33 officers, 4 Sergeants, and 4 Lieutenants who provide the first response to calls for service. Patrol Sergeants have various duties including overseeing department employees in the prevention and initial investigation of crimes, resolution of individual and community problems, protection of life and property, and the enforcement of laws and ordinances. Patrol Lieutenants are responsible for the day-to-day operations of the shift and for shift staffing and scheduling, briefing patrol staff, as well as reviewing and approving all completed police reports. Both Sergeants and Lieutenants assume the roll of Field Supervisors and provide expertise in patrol operations.

Patrol officers are responsible for citizen-initiated calls for service, as well as officerinitiated calls for service, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Other functions performed by the Patrol Division include: preventive patrols, preliminary criminal investigations, traffic enforcement, response to all emergency incidents and accident investigations.





TRAFFIC INVESTIGATIONS UNIT







The Traffic Investigations Unit is a professional and effective team of officers dedicated to the safety of motorists and pedestrians within Bloomfield Township. The Traffic Investigations Unit takes a proactive approach to traffic related issues. The goal of the Traffic Unit is not only to seek out aggressive drivers and issue citations, but to educate the public regarding traffic laws and safety.

Officers assigned to the Traffic Unit can often be seen patrolling on motorcycles. The motorcycles allow officers the ability to maneuver through highly congested traffic areas to better respond to calls for service.

Traffic safety around schools and residential neighborhoods is one of the primary concerns for the Traffic Unit. Traffic officers are responsible for monitoring traffic patterns and related issues during high traffic times in an effort to mitigate traffic congestion and increase the safety of motorists and pedestrians.

TRAFFIC INVESTIGATIONS UNIT



S.O.C.C.I.T.

Recognizing the complex nature of traffic crash investigations, the Bloomfield Township Police Department co-founded the South Oakland County Crash Investigation Team (S.O.C.C.I.T.) with Auburn Hills Police Department and Troy Police Department. Traffic investigators from each agency train in advanced crash investigations and respond to major traffic crashes in any of the three jurisdictions.

Since these types of crashes require advanced investigative skills and often require reconstruction of scenes, this partnership has proven to be a valuable resource. In addition to crash investigations, this team also works together to conduct area traffic enforcement activities targeting Drunk/Drugged Driving, Seat Belt Enforcement and Distracted Driving. Since its inception, the team has expanded to include Bloomfield Hills, Birmingham and Clawson Police Departments.

CANINE UNIT



The Bloomfield Township Police Department has one of the longest running Canine Units in the State of Michigan (formed in the 1960's). The Bloomfield Township Police Canine Unit consists of two teams: Officer Carlson with K-9 Kody and Officer Follman with K-9 Max. Our K-9 teams are specifically trained in tracking and trailing fleeing criminals and lost children or adults. They also have the ability to locate discarded items, as well as detect the odor of narcotics.

Based on their training, K-9 Kody and K-9 Max are utilized when an officer's safety is at risk.

The K-9 teams also attend numerous civilian functions throughout the year. These events include school visits and demonstrations, Bloomfield Township Open House, and local civic group presentations.

DISPATCH CENTER



The center of any public safety department is the Dispatch Center, also known as the P.S.A.P. (Public Safety Answering Point). The Dispatch Center receives all emergency telephone calls for both the Police Department and the Fire Department. The 13 Dispatchers answer both non-emergency and 911 calls. Calls are entered into the C.A.D. (Computer Aided Dispatching) system where they are dispatched to police or fire personnel. All 13 of Bloom-field Township's dispatchers are specially trained to handle high stress telephone calls.

Bloomfield Township Dispatchers are tasked with monitoring multiple live-feed security cameras throughout the Bloomfield Township campus.

POLICE SERVICES

Animal Welfare

Bloomfield Township operates a state-certified animal shelter. This state-of-the-art facility is staffed by two uniformed Animal Welfare Officers and one civilian employee. This building is capable of providing shelter for dogs, cats, and a variety of other wildlife. The staff collects and provides temporary care for animals until, the animal can be claimed or transported to a facility for extended care.

Animal Welfare Officers answer questions from the public ranging from pet care to animal adoptions. They assist the police department in the collection and disposal of deceased wildlife and are occasionally called upon to enforce state laws and township ordinances regarding pets. These knowledgeable officers also assist citizens with the trapping and prevention of nuisance animals.

The officers commonly are called to pick up and dispose of deceased wildlife both on and off the roadway. Smaller animals are taken to Gasow Veterinary Clinic for treatment or disposal. While the operating cost of the animal shelter are covered by Bloomfield Township, other expenses are offset by public donations (i.e. food, blankets and animal toys). VILLAGE POLICE DEPARTMENT



The unique residential community of Bloomfield Village is a part of Bloomfield Township. The residents have chosen to fund one additional property tax mill to support the cost of additional law enforcement presence. Through this arrangement, the Patrol Division of the Bloomfield Township Police Department and the Bloomfield Village Police Department share law enforcement patrol responsibilities in Bloomfield Village. Criminal matters requiring extensive follow up investigations remain under the jurisdiction of Bloomfield Township. The Bloomfield Village Police Department consists of three full-time patrol officers under the field supervision of one patrol sergeant and operates out of its own police and fire facility at 3595 Bradway Boulevard.





Investigations Sergeant

The mission of the Investigations Division is to investigate, identify, arrest, and successfully prosecute individuals involved in criminal activity within Bloomfield Township. The Division is also responsible for the collection, dissemination, and management of criminal intelligence information. The Investigations Division consists of three independent units: Detectives, Community Resources and Youth Services.

Most often, Detectives investigate cases that are initiated by members of the Patrol Division. Cases are prioritized for assignment by crime type and seriousness. A case where evidence exists occasionally result in a clearance and can lead to the clearance of multiple crimes. Many times the suspect of one crime is also responsible for others.

Members of the Investigations Division are available Monday through Friday and are available after hours to assist the Patrol Division, should they need expertise, guidance, or assistance. On major cases, Detectives will be called into work during their off-duty hours to handle investigations requiring immediate attention.









Case Clearance

The Investigations Division is comprised of five full-time Detectives, a Detective Sergeant and a Detective Lieutenant. All of our Detectives are well educated and trained to investigate some of the most demanding and challenging cases police can be involved in. Some crimes may take months, or even years to fully investigate. Detectives assigned to investigate these cases have developed an advanced level of expertise by attending specialized training and by gaining years of experience working on cases with other law enforcement colleagues at the local, state and federal levels.

The Investigations Division Lieutenant also oversees the Bloomfield Township officers assigned to specialty units such as the Narcotics Enforcement Team (NET), Special Investigations Unit (SIU) and the F.B.I.'s Violent Crimes Task Force (VCTF). The Investigations Division interacts with many outside law enforcement agencies including the FBI, Secret Service, ATF, DEA and Customs/Border Patrol. Members of the Investigations Division participate regularly with the Major Case Assistance Team (MCAT). This team is comprised of





multiple law enforcement agencies and investigators with specific expertise in investigative areas. The team works together to aid an agency that experiences a major crime.

School Liaison Officer Activity

Bloomfield Township dedicates an officer to the School Liaison Officer (SLO) position. The concept behind the SLO program is to help youth through some of their most difficult challenges, working together to provide tools and understanding to help kids grow into

successful adults. The SLO program is a proactive approach to identifying risk factors that face today's youth, including drug, alcohol and tobacco use, peer pressure, and bullying. This program reflects the community's desire to ensure that its schools are safe and secure.

School Liaison Officer Responsibilities include:

- Investigate both adult and juvenile cases •
- Write/Serve warrant and court orders
- Investigate reports of Missing/Runaway juveniles involving other government agencies.
- Organize/Conduct operations related to tobacco and alcoholic beverage sale to juveniles/minors
- Provide Juvenile Law training to department members
- Build relationships between the Police Department and the school community
- Mediating police matters in the school buildings


Property Section

The Administrative Sergeant maintains the police departments evidence and property room. The Sergeant utilizes barcoding software to log, track, and document the items collected by department members. The Bloomfield Township Police Department went completely online with evidence processing, eliminating the need for any paper when processing evidence.

The Administrative Sergeant operates within a continuous cycle of receiving, storing and disposing of items taken into possession. Items are purged as cases are adjudicated, when they are no longer needed as evidence, or can be disposed of by local, state, and federal laws. This is a lengthy process of researching the status of case reports, disposition approval with various officers, prosecutors and other personnel, researching court dockets, and sentencing information. Disposal of sensitive items such as biohazards, hazardous materials, and confidential documents is done through secure means.

Administrative Sergeant's responsibilities:

- Processing and logging all property and evidence entered into the system.
- Maintenance and disposal of property and evidence in accordance with state and federal regulations.
- Maintain a record of all property movement to court, crime lab, investigations and disposal.

Records Unit

The Records Unit is a service support unit within the Administrative Bureau and is supervised by the Administrative Sergeant. Each year, records clerks process thousands of reports generated by members of the Police Department. Those documents also require records personnel to enter and file report attachments, such as witness statements and Freedom Of Information Act requests (FOIA). The records clerks also staff the front counter of the Police Department which includes providing information and assistance to the public, providing customers with copies of reports, and arranging for civilian fingerprinting.








Group 'A' Complaints






Group 'B' Complaints

Group 'B' criminal complaints include both felony and misdemeanor crimes. These crimes are punishable by time served in the county jail and cover both state and local laws. A misdemeanor crime is less serious than a felony. Misdemeanor crimes are usually distinguished from a felony by the seriousness of injury caused to a person, the cash value of the property taken, or the amount and type of illegal substance in a person's possession.






Group 'C' Complaints




Alarm Activity

Bystanders were able to remove the child from the pool. Johanna checked the child and found he was not breathing. Johanna immediately began life-saving CPR. While performing CPR, the child regained consciousness and began breathing. The child was taken to the hospital for examination.

For her heroic efforts, Johanna was awarded the Bloomfield Police Department's Distinguished Citizen Award.



On July 11, 2017, Olivia Mackley began receiving text messages from a friend. The text messages were strange and made reference to the sender possibly contemplating suicide. Olivia recognized the seriousness of the messages and rather than ignoring the texts, she took action and notified her mother (Anne Cupp). Mrs. Cupp contacted friends and parents of the victim and the police department. When officers arrived at the friend's house, the friend was attempting suicide which was stopped by officers. Because of the mature decision made by Olivia and the quick and decisive actions taken by her mother Mrs. Cupp, a tragedy was adverted and a life was saved.

Both Olivia and Mrs. Cupp were awarded 2017 Distinguished Citizen Awards.

The Police Department provides fun activities for children and adults, tours of the police station, police car rides, and displays of police equipment. Concealed Pistol License Class


The Bloomfield Township Police Department periodically teaches a concealed pistol license class. This course is certified through the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards (M.C.O.L.E.S.). The course places heavy emphasis on firearms safety, the laws concerning legal concealed carry, appropriate use of force, confrontation avoidance, and pistol marksmanship.

Students are taught by Certified Police Pistol Instructors during the eight hour course. Half of the class is spent in the classroom the other half of the class is spent on the Police Departments Firing Range. Students leave this class with the skills and knowledge to responsibly and safely carry a concealed pistol.
