Safety paths prove to be a great asset to residents

Since 1999 Township residents have had the pleasure of a network of safety paths connecting their neighborhoods with schools, shopping areas and other locations in the Township. The Jan Roncelli Safety Path program, partly the result of the tireless efforts of former Township Clerk Roncelli, has proven to be tremendously popular. Currently there are over 70 miles of safety paths throughout the Township. On any given day in the spring, summer or fall children and adults can be seen walking or riding bikes along the paths and enjoying the natural features of the Township.

"When we moved to the township 12 years ago the one thing we thought our neighborhood was lacking was sidewalks," said resident Bret Chennault.

"When we learned a few years later that there'd be safety paths created we were very excited. Since their installation on 14 Mile, Lincoln, and very recently Lahser we have used and enjoyed them immensely. We use them several times a week and feel more connected to neighbors in other parts of our subdivision. We feel the installation of safety paths are a great use of our tax dollars, encourage people to exercise, and foster greater connection between area residents."

"Many times I see residents using a newly constructed safety path even before the grass is growing back or the area is fully restored," said Olivia Olsztyn-Budry, director of the Engineering & Environmental Department. To Olsztyn-Budry, this proves the value residents place on completing the network according to the master plan.

The original safety path master plan was developed in 1999, and updated in 2008 and 2018. Since then, no additional routes have been added by the Board of Trustees. A total of 10.8 miles of safety path from the master plan remain to be constructed. The estimated cost (in 2022 dollars) is \$15,832,000. Residents have recognized the value of the program and voted to approve the safety path millage in past elections, dating back to 1998, when it was first proposed, and voting in favor of renewals in the years since. Residents will be asked to consider a renewal of the safety path millage on the ballot in November.

In addition to the cost of constructing the paths, the Township must also use the funds collected as the result of the millage to perform necessary maintenance on them. Maintenance tasks can include concrete slab replacement and retaining wall repairs. Township staff checks the paths for needed repairs, but can't consistently walk the more than 70 miles of paths, so the Engineering & **Environmental Department** relies on residents to report issues.

"Residents who use the paths are the best watchdogs when it comes to maintenance. They report issues with overgrown vegetation or needed concrete repairs," said Olsztyn-Budry. "Residents know they can call or email us any time, and we'll be able to address any issues that come up."

Dani Walsh, Bloomfield Township Supervisor Public Safety millage passes; Safety Paths and Senior Services on November ballot

As a fellow resident, I want to say thank you to everyone who voted in the August election and made their voice heard. Township voters gave a resounding yes to the Public Safety Millage Replacement proposal on the August ballot with 63% voting in favor of combining two public safety millages with an increase that is entirely dedicated to public safety. I know it can be hard to stay positive in a social media world of negativity, but this community continually rises above it and proved it values the Police and Fire services that attend to the health and safety of our neighbors.

Police and Fire have both been operating with low staff levels, and with this millage passing we can bring back positions and ensure both departments have the absolute best resources and tools to keep us all safe. The number one non-violent crime reported by residents is traffic violations. The public safety millage gives us the ability to bring back the traffic investigations unit. The public safety millage also allows the Fire Department to update lifesaving equipment and bring back positions to reduce overtime and ensure that firefighters and paramedics are able to provide the best care possible. These are just some examples of how your support improves public safety in our community.

We now look towards the November 8 General Election which sees two millage proposals: a millage renewal for the Safety Path Program, and a millage renewal and a small increase for Senior Services. Both millages have been approved by voters in the township. The two millage proposals were moved to November 2022 in order to save residents the cost (more than \$100,000) of a special election next year. It also gives us the opportunity to hear from more residents since there is a higher voter turnout in gubernatorial and

presidential election years than in special elections.

In 1999, one of the very first safety paths was installed in front of my home. Since that time, the safety path network has greatly expanded. Inside this newsletter you will find a map of the safety paths that connect Township highlights such as Bowers Farm, the Franklin Cider Mill and the Township Public Library. If voters renew the five-year proposal, it will fund the construction of new safety paths as outlined in the master plan, maintain the existing safety paths, and update older safety paths to current ADA standards. Mowing and cleaning debris and costs related to that work are essential to maintaining this asset. The safety path millage is a straight renewal with no increase.

The pandemic was far less kind to our Senior Center, which saw consistently rising numbers of residents using the facility until the shutdown of 2020. The inability of some of our most vulnerable residents to gather at the center created many challenges for our Senior Services. BTSS adapted by offering online classes for enrichment and exercise, increased deliveries of Meals on Wheels with more people shut-in, delivered nonperishable pantry boxes to low income seniors, continued transportation to medical appointments, and coordinated the temporary citizens' hotline with police and fire for any need. Covid did open us up to some homebound residents through the virtual options. As we reopened in 2021, we developed a hybrid model of in person and virtual class options to continue to serve everyone.

Few people realize that residents as young as 50 are eligible to use the Senior Center. As an older community, 48 percent of all Township residents are aged 50 and over. In addition, 41 percent of all households in the Township have someone aged 65 or older. Although fitness and aquatics amenities and classes are available, Senior Services also has a positive impact on mental health of the community by helping older residents escape isolation through socialization and enrichment activities.

The original Senior Services millage was based on limited services in a small space we rented in a former elementary school. Since that time, demand for senior services increased dramatically, which led to the construction of a 24,000 square-foot building, with modern amenities, expanded services, and need for maintenance of the infrastructure. The cost of providing this facility and services is larger than the original millage from years ago, which covered a small group of people and services in the past. Because of the increase in services and infrastructure. this is a renewal with a request of an increase of about 10 cents per 1000 (0.1027 mil).

Township to decide how to use ARPA funds

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) is a nearly 2 trillion-dollar stimulus bill designed to speed up economic recovery for citizens, businesses and governments in the wake of the pandemic. Michigan Townships with a population of less than 50,000 were originally not entitled to ARPA funding. However, adjustments to allow for larger Townships like Bloomfield to receive funds were made grouping these communities as Non-Entitlement Units (NEUs). Although Bloomfield's population is larger than many cities as a NEU we only received \$4.4 Million in ARPA Funds to help supplement services and counterbalance decreased revenue experienced in 2020 and 2021.

According to Supervisor Dani Walsh, "Initially the money came with extreme limitations and was initially restricted to federal initiatives to expand broadband, water, and sewer to underserved communities. These limitations penalized communities like Bloomfield Township that already had access to those 3 fundamental areas. We joined other communities in lobbying our federal officials for leniency and expansion of initiatives. Thankfully we waited, because the final rule was changed and now NEUs can use these funds to positively impact their individual community needs. Being patient and practical paid off and now we can focus on improving resources and services."

The Board of Trustees held its first study session on September 6 with presentations from each Department on their long-term capital needs and improving services. There will be community engagement and additional study sessions to fully consider and discuss the departmental, community, and trustee ideas. The final plan on how to spend the money must be decided by December 31, 2024. The funds must be completely spent by December 31, 2026. The entire amount has been received and will remain on the balance sheet until qualified expenditures are incurred.

All study sessions are open to the public. Study sessions can be viewed on the Township website's Video on Demand page, and the minutes of the study session can be found on Documents on Demand.

Caring for your house and yard helps maintain high property values

Property values are a major concern in every community. Please do your part this Fall to keep your neighborhood looking the best that it can be. With the summer season ending, now is the time to makes plans to do the final cleanup of your yard. Weed the flower beds and gardens, and remove unwanted and unused items from the yard. Lawn tools, unused bags of mulch, empty or dead plant pots, etc.,



should be placed in your shed or garage and out of public view. Yard waste collection is included in the cost of your trash removal, so make use of this service! After raking your leaves place them in brown paper yard waste bags or trash cans labeled "Compost" to be collected with the weekly trash collection. The collection dates for yard waste run from the week of March 15 to December 16, 2022.

It's that time of year again...

Every year some Township residents see their mailboxes topple over as a result of snowplows piling snow against weak posts or hardware. In an effort to reduce the likelihood of this happening, the Bloomfield Township Department of Public Works is encouraging residents to "Shake Your Mailbox."

This will tell you whether your mailbox posts are sturdy and

the hardware is holding them is in good shape. If not, you will be able to correct any problems before damage from snowplows occurs. Repairing or replacing mailboxes now could also present delays in mail delivery.

Millage request for Senior Services to be on the November ballot

Bloomfield Township Senior Services operates a beautiful, state-of-the-art senior center designed to serve the needs of adults age 50 and over in the community. In addition to the amenities designed to help seniors stay fit and healthy – a warm-water pool, indoor walking track, fitness studio and equipment - the center provides spaces for enrichment and social programs. The center hosts 70,000 visits annually. Vital to the mission of Senior Services are the supportive services offered. BTSS answers a total of 26,000 support service requests annually, which can be a meal, a ride to the center or a medical appointment, a friendly call, an hour of dementia care, a home repair, a support group visit, or a loan of a walker or wheelchair.

The Township is a mature community, with nearly 50 percent of residents aged 50 or more, and 41 percent of households having someone age 65 or over. Demand for low wages and contract providers, is a most cost-efficient department, expenses have grown faster than revenue. A millage renewal, along with a small millage increase,

services will continue to grow as people prefer to age in place. Although Senior Services, because of a high level of part-time employees, for Senior Services will be on the ballot in November, 2022. Currently the millage collected to fund BTSS is equal to one-half of a penny of each

dollar paid by taxpayers. This amount covers only 52 percent of operating expenses. Fees for classes, donations, grants and various fundraising efforts bring in additional funds, but not enough to eliminate the ongoing deficit. Providing valuable services to the community at the lowest possible cost is an ongoing effort. The upcoming Compassion Walk is an example of the fundraising efforts BTSS relies on to supplement taxpayer-provided funds.

"We are committed to offering excellent services to residents," Senior Services Director Christine Tvaroha said. "Township residents who may need these services are encouraged to reach out to BTSS by calling 248-723-3500."

Popular Drop-Off Days Return this Fall

Residents will be able to dispose of hazardous waste and old electronics this fall, when the popular Household Hazardous Waste Drop Off Day and the Electronic Recycling, Medication Disposal and Paper Shredding events return to the Township campus. This is a great opportunity to clean out your garage and basement in an environmentallysound way.

"I'm thankful to my fellow Board of Trustee members for their unanimous support in bringing back these beloved community events. Not only are the events a convenient benefit to residents who empty garages, closets, and desks of all the household waste, but it also benefits the environment knowing all of those items will be disposed of properly and not thrown into a landfill," said Supervisor Dani Walsh.

Household Hazardous Waste crews will be on hand on October I from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. to take items such as drain cleaners, weed killer, gasoline, motor oil, starter fluid, transmission fluid, paint, fluorescent light bulbs/PBC ballasts, household batteries and automotive batteries, propane, fire extinguishers, old tires and much more. Medical sharps must be in rigid, puncture resistant container with a lid.

items accepted visit the Township website. No electronic waste, medication or paper shredding will be accepted at this event. The last HHW Drop-Off

Day, held on Oct. 2, 2021,

saw a total of 1,552 vehicles come through. At this year's event there will be signs on Telegraph and Long Lake directing traffic.

The other very popular event is the Electronic Recycling, Medication Disposal and Paper Shredding, to be held this year on Saturday, November 5, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. This is your chance to get rid of old computers, TVs, VCRs, and other outdated electronic items. Safely dispose of old, unused medications, and documents that are no longer needed.

Both events are open to Township residents only, and proof of residency is required.
