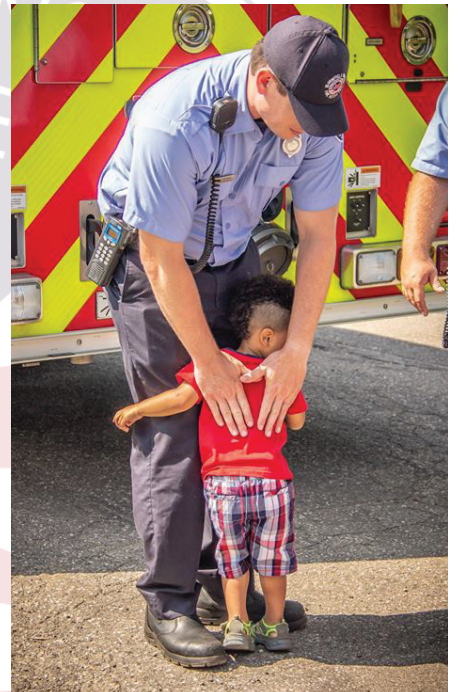
CHIEF'S REPORT

The members of the Bloomfield Township Fire Department are pleased to submit to you the 2018 annual report. The following pages are made up of data collected throughout the year to give a snapshot of the fire department activities.

The data represents the response to the demands of the community, included are; training hours to develop and hone our skills, non-emergency response, and response to structure fires and life threatening emergencies. More importantly: I invite you to look a little deeper at the pictures that accompany the data and reports from the various officers. The pictures tell more of the story than could possibly be shown in graphs and numbers. It's the story of giving hope, joy, a sense of security, and most importantly trust in the Bloomfield Township community. This is achieved via many of the programs designed to give back to the community.



Programs such as “Moonbeams for Sweet Dreams”, that invites members of the community to shine some light into the lives of pediatric patients throughout the holidays. This event runs through the month of December, where departments from around the area light up the parking lot with flashlights and emergency vehicles lights, while the kids in the pediatric wing of WBRO shine their flashlights back.

The Fire and Life Safety Division's (FLSD) award winning fire safety and injury prevention program, in its 14th year, begins each spring for all 2nd graders of the Bloomfield Hills School District. Our long supported U of M “Juvenile Fire Starters” program and Fire Department Open House helps teach kids how to think safety to help reduce accidental injuries.

The EMS division's Community CPR and "Stop the Bleed" classes for both businesses and residents, help provide the victims of a cardiac arrest, choking or bleeding, the best chance possible for a positive outcome. Our child safety seat installation program is very popular and runs all year long. This program instills a sense of safety and security to parents, with every seat installation.

The BTFD golf outing in May (in its 33rd year), annual hockey tournament in October, also in October, Pink shirts for Breast cancer awareness ramps up, where money is raised by the sale of pink Tee Shirts and donated for breast cancer research, and ending with the MDA boot drive in November, which all raise money within our community to help others heal and recover from losses personally, physically and financially.

So it's the pictures that really tell the story of the importance of re-investing in the community, whether it is a block party, parade, open house, home inspection, fire house dinner, career day event or charity event. Our goal is to deliver a message of safety and preparedness at any point of contact within the community, while providing help and assistance when needed. 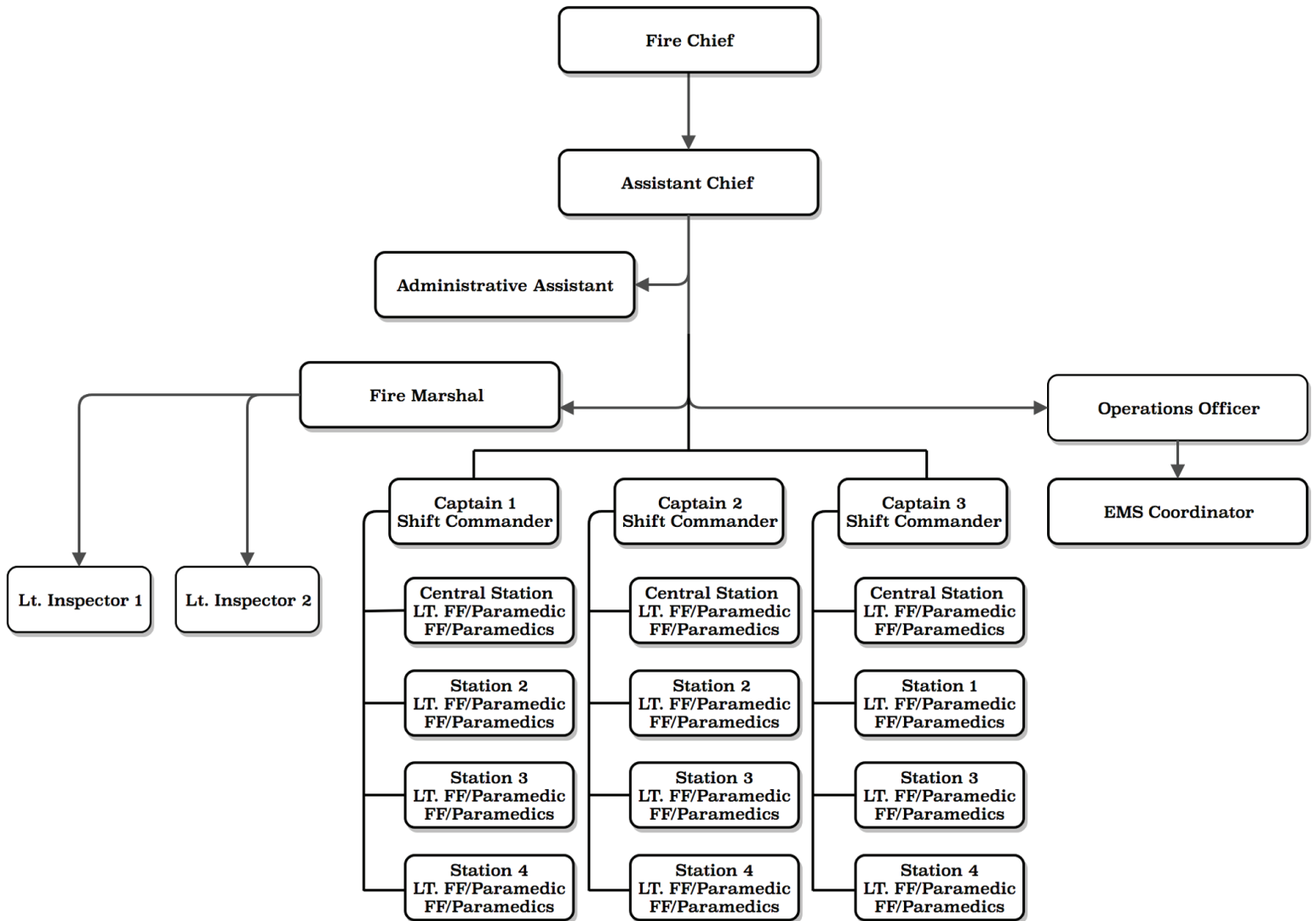

Central Fire Station is located at 1155 Exeter, in Bloomfield Township's Municipal Government Complex. It houses one Paramedic Ladder truck, one Incident Command vehicle, one Paramedic Rescue truck, one Water Rescue Boat, one Special Operations and Rescue truck (S.O.A.R.), and numerous staff and utility vehicles.

Central Fire Station serves a mostly residential area in the heart of Bloomfield Township. In addition to residences, Central Fire Station protects many well known structures such as Wabeek Country Club, Kirk in the Hills, and the Bloomfield Township Library to name a few. Central Fire Station also has the job of protecting several condo complexes, some light mercantile, and the major thoroughfare of Telegraph Road.

Central Fire Station is staffed with one Shift Commander (Captain/Paramedic), one Lieutenant/Paramedic, and five additional Firefighter/Paramedics. The fire department's administrative staff, including the Fire Chief, Assistant Fire Chief, Operations Officer, Fire Marshal, EMS Coordinator, two Fire Inspectors, and Administrative Assistant are also located at this station.

Fire Station 2 is located at 1063 Westview, on the Township's northeast side. This fire station houses one Paramedic Engine and one Paramedic Rescue truck to protect its district. A Lieutenant/Paramedic and three Firefighter/Paramedics, are assigned to this fire station. Fire Station 2 protects residential areas, light mercantile areas, and the major thoroughfares of I-75, Woodward Avenue, and Square Lake Road. Some of the notable structures located in Station 2's area are the International Academy, Bowers School Farm, Oakland Community College offices, and Sacred Heart.

Fire Station 3 is located at 4151 W. Maple on the Township's southwest side. This fire station houses one Paramedic Engine, one Paramedic Rescue truck, and one reserve Paramedic Engine. A Lieutenant/Paramedic and three Firefighter/Paramedics are assigned to this fire station. Fire Station 3 serves a mainly residential area, including Bloomfield Village, some light mercantile and the major thoroughfares of Telegraph and Maple Roads. Some of the notable buildings protected by Station 3 are Oakland Hills Country Club, Franklin Cider Mill, Birmingham Athletic Club, Birmingham Country Club, Sunrise Assisted Living (South), and Temple Beth El.

Fire Station 4 is located at 2389 Franklin Road on the Township's north side. This fire station houses one Paramedic Ladder Truck, one Paramedic Rescue truck, one reserve Paramedic Engine, and Fire Prevention Van. A Lieutenant/Paramedic and three Firefighter/Paramedics are assigned to this station. Fire Station 4 serves an area of residential, light through heavy mercantile, light industrial, and major thoroughfares of Telegraph Road, Square Lake Road, Woodward Avenue, and I-75. Some of the notable buildings in this area include Forest Lake Country Club, Bloomfield Town Square, Carl's Golf Land, and Sunrise Assisted Living (North).

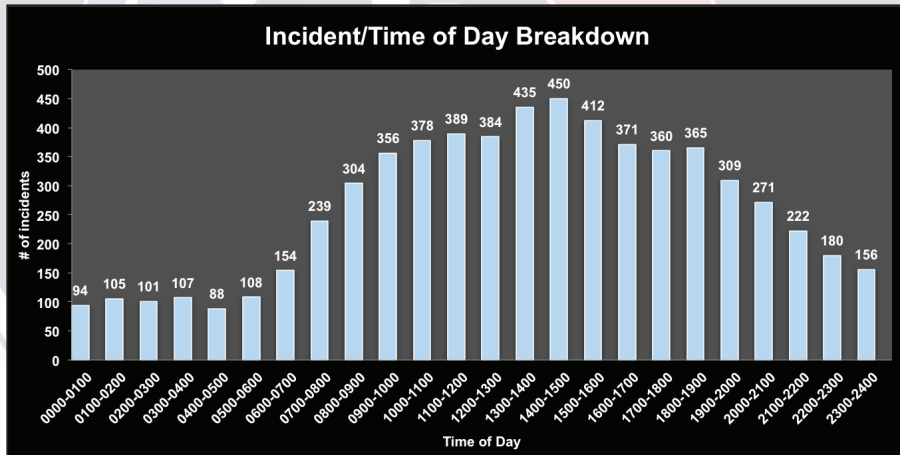
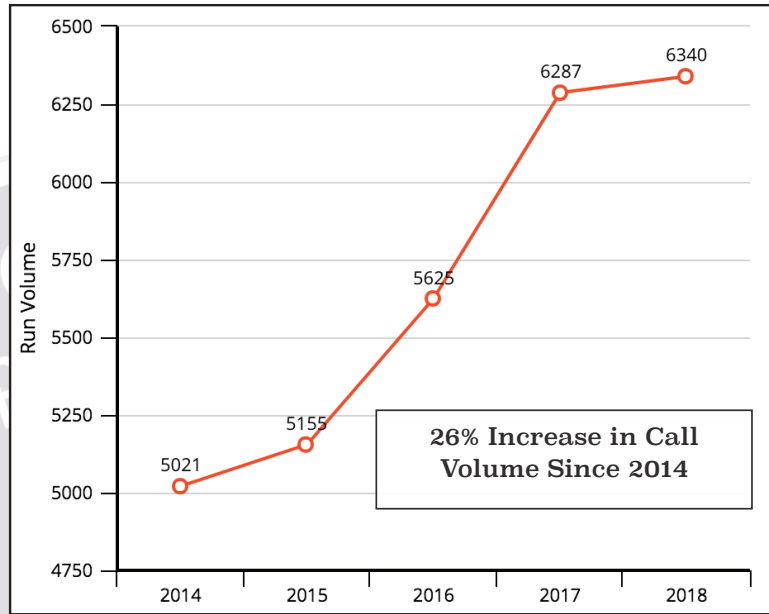

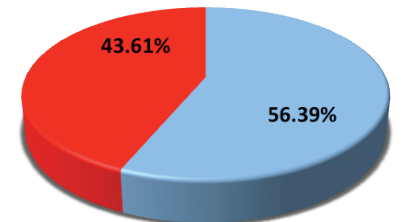

TRAINING REPORT

On a national level, fire service training is perhaps the most prolific component of being a successful and safe Fire Department. The Bloomfield Township Fire Department takes training to another level. The training that is done here is designed to be challenging and thought provoking to make all of our firefighters better educated and safer in the performance of their duties.

The fire service is constantly evolving and the training has to evolve with it. Fifty years ago homes were made of dimensional lumber and belongings were made of natural materials like cotton, wool and wood. Today homes are made primarily of synthetic materials like particle board, which is made of wood chips and glue, and other oil-based materials. These lightweight synthetic materials burn hotter and faster than previous building generations, presenting many different challenges for first responders. The training that the BTFD does on an annual basis addresses these challenges in order to keep the residents, visitors and firefighters of Bloomfield Township safe.

In 2018 the Bloomfield Township Fire Department completed **16,757 hours of training**. The training consisted of Firefighting, EMS, Officer Development, Public Education, Technical Rescue, Professional Emergency Management, Michigan Task Force One and Physical Fitness. These all-encompassing trainings help the first responder to maintain their skills, education and fitness to keep all involved safe. The BTFD has a couple mottos, “Every Day is a Training Day” and “Everyone Goes Home Safe”. These go hand in hand with the training that is completed on a daily basis. The Department has built a training structure and established a training ground and is available for use not only for the BTFD but other area Fire Departments.

The BTFD Training grounds has hosted many different kinds of training evolutions this year. The OAKWAY Mutual Aid group hosted a two-day firefighter save your own class. This class is designed to teach firefighters how to save themselves from trouble in a fire. The facility was used by the Bloomfield Township Police Department in training for active shooter and barricaded gunmen scenarios. Most recently the BTFD held a three-day mini academy to assist the newer members of the Fire Department to get back to the basic core firefighting fundamentals. This multi-use facility allows for comprehensive skills based training to be completed, in Bloomfield Township, on a daily basis, which would normally have to be completed at another offsite location. The benefits of this training site will be seen for years to come.

Moving forward the Bloomfield Township Fire Department will keep training at the highest of levels, to ensure the BTFD personnel are the best in their profession and that “Everyone Goes Home Safe.”

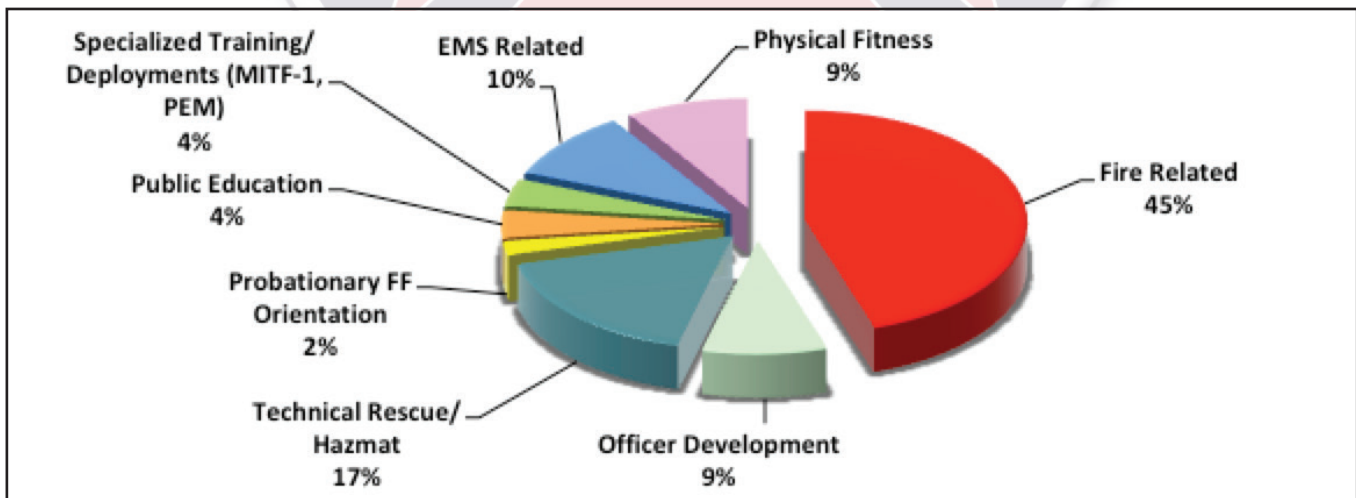

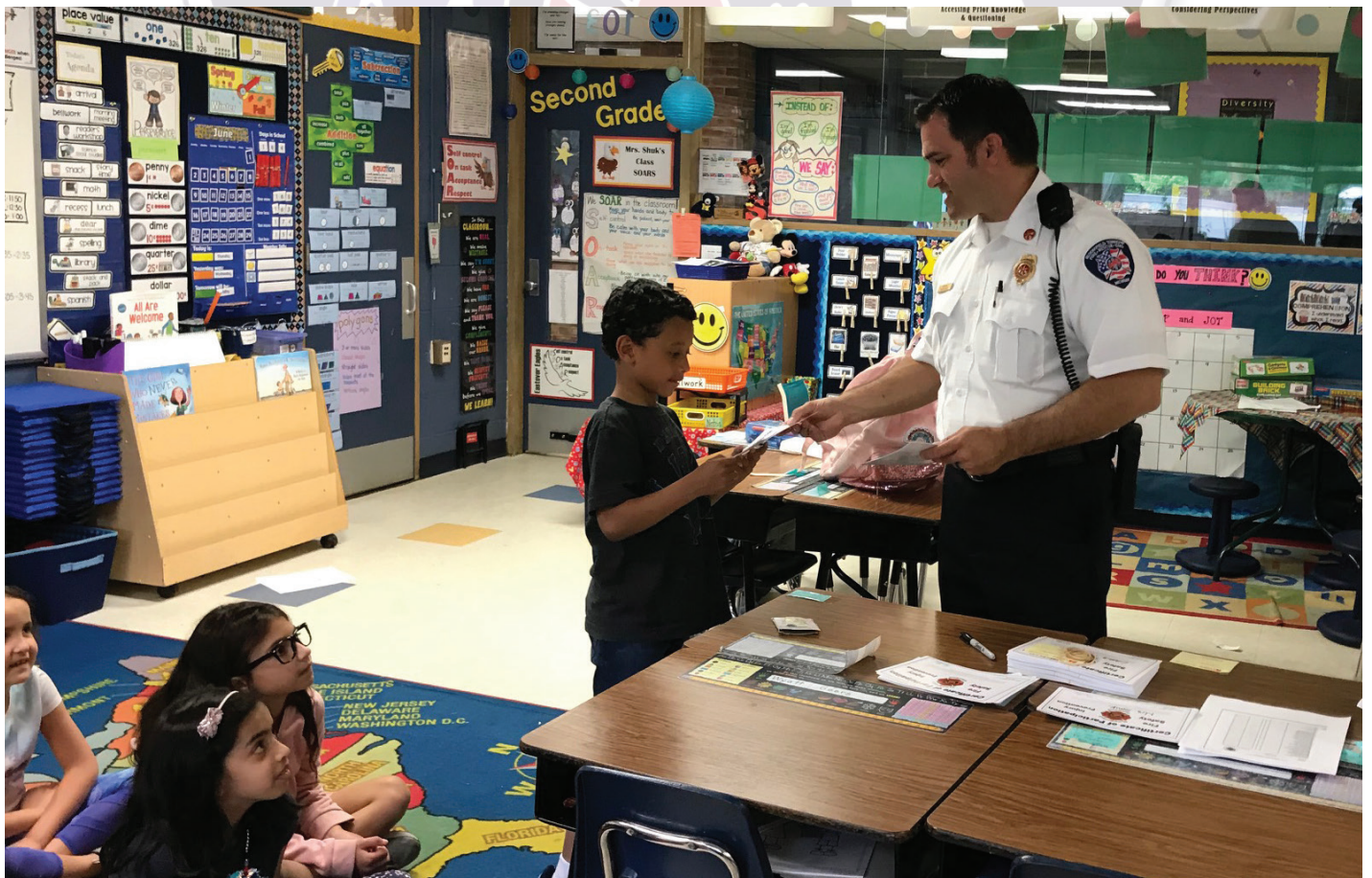

FIRE MARSHAL REPORT

This past year proved to be a productive, yet challenging for the Bloomfield Township Fire and Life Safety Division (FLSD). As we worked constantly to meet the demands of the quick changing community we were also committed to providing the highest level of customer service. This ranged from commercial fire inspections and construction plan reviews to residential home fire inspections, residential smoke alarm installations, and lock box consultations.

The fire department participated in the annual Bloomfield Township Public Open House in October which coincided with National Fire Prevention Week (FPW). The fire department's open house events included a live fire and home fire sprinkler demonstration, repelling from a building, a live firefighter skill challenge competition, Sparky the Fire Dog, fire truck train rides, numerous fire safety games for children, and many other exhibits that promoted fire safety in the home.

This year also marked our 13th year for the fire safety and injury prevention school program in the Bloomfield Hills School District. The program teaches second graders the importance of making safe choices and preventing injuries caused by accidents.

Additional duties of the FLSD include conducting various types of fire inspections and construction plan reviews. While performing inspections the Fire and Life Safety Division takes the opportunity to educate the community on many different fire safety issues.

The Fire and Life Safety Division is also responsible for the investigation of all structure fires, incendiary fires, and fires resulting in injury and/or death. These investigations are conducted for the purpose of preventing future fires by identifying common risk factors.

This past year also provided some changes in the Fire and Life Safety Division. Firefighter Joseph Syracuse was promoted to Lieutenant Fire Inspector and joined our division in April.

The Fire and Life Safety Division is continuously striving to develop and promote the most innovated public education programs possible.

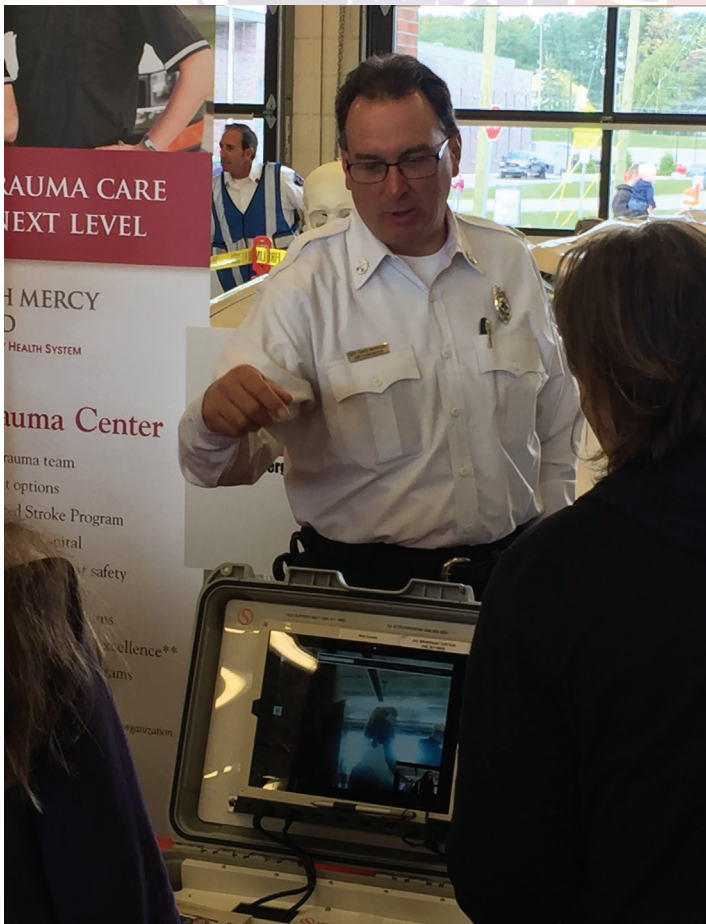

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES REPORT

Again this year, Bloomfield Township Fire Department (BTFD) has had an increase in total calls for service which includes an increase in emergency medical responses. Despite being busier in 2018, the BTFD still responded to our residents that were experiencing a medical emergency with at least four highly trained paramedics. All paramedics are required by the State of Michigan to complete many hours of continuing medical education training, in addition, our medics must stay current on new equipment and scientific trends in pre-hospital emergency medical care. This is a significant task considering ALL Bloomfield Township fire personnel are trained to the level of paramedic.

BTFD is involved in two on-going studies related to expanding our Emergency Medical Services. The first study is a Community Paramedicine program where BTFD is partnering with St. Joseph Mercy Hospital. This program involves Fire Department paramedics and St. Joe's doctors who work together to ensure that the participating Bloomfield Township resident that has recently been discharged from the hospital is following their discharge plan. The paramedics will visit with the resident at their home and the physician will join the visit remotely via secure video technology. The goal is to provide a Community paramedicine program that can address the resident's specific health care needs and offer the knowledge and resources to support home recovery.

The second study is an OCMCA Stroke Special Study conducted by Oakland County Medical Control Authority. The purpose of this study is to determine if EMS personnel can identify patients that are candidates for endovascular therapy (EVT) with a reasonable degree of accuracy, utilizing a pre-hospital stroke severity scale. The study ran for all of 2018 and has been continued into 2019. Bloomfield Township Fire Department is the only life support agency in the state participating in this kind of stroke study.

Finally, in an effort to provide the best EMS possible, the BTFD contracted the help of the EMS Survey Team which provided monthly feedback based on surveys sent to patients that our paramedics treated and transported to the hospital. Proudly, I can report that the Bloomfield Township Fire Department consistently receives scores in the 95-97% range. These scores reflect the paramedic's performance on skills, attitude, concern toward the patients and comfort of the ambulance ride to name a few.

The residents of Bloomfield Village are in a unique situation as they are protected by a volunteer fire department, Bloomfield Village Fire Department (BVFD), and Bloomfield Township Fire Department (BTFD). BVFD assisted BTFD on all fire calls in the village last year.

Our volunteer firefighters live in the village, are state certified, must be available to respond to calls, and participate in training throughout the year. In addition to the 12 volunteers, we have a full time Lieutenant on the department who oversees the day to day operations of the village fire station.

The Bloomfield Village Fire Department budget is authorized by a special assessment district. These monies are billed by Bloomfield Township in the winter tax statement to all properties in Bloomfield Village. There are 991 parcels of land in the village.

In 2018, Bloomfield Village Fire Department had a total of 97 runs for the year. In October Mike Cummings, formerly of BTFD, was hired to oversee the day to day operations, provide training to volunteers, and respond to medical runs in the Village. BVFD this past year participated in the Celebrate Birmingham Parade, Amberly Block Party, BVFD Open House, trips to local schools to teach fire safety, and the annual delivery of Santa Claus to the Christmas tree lighting at Hackett Hall.

BVFD operates one fire engine and one four-wheel-drive emergency vehicle.

The Bloomfield Village Fire Station is located at 3595 Bradway Boulevard.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIVISION

In 2018, the Bloomfield Township Emergency Management Division continued to serve its residents, businesses and visitors by working to ensure that the emergency response personnel, and the employees of Bloomfield Township, would be prepared to minimize the impact of any natural or man-made disaster incident.

Under the authority of the Michigan Emergency Management Act (Public Act 390 of 1976, as amended), each county is required to appoint an emergency management coordinator. In addition, some Michigan communities have municipal emergency management coordinators. Bloomfield Township is a one of four municipalities in Oakland County that has its own Emergency Management Coordinator.

The Emergency Management Division has been active in training events throughout the year. Some of our training highlights for 2018 included:

- Professional Emergency Management (PEM) training through the Michigan state Police. Bloomfield Township currently has four PEM certified personnel that coordinate and manage the Township's emergency management.
- Attendance at the Great Lakes Homeland Security (GLHS) Conference in Grand Rapids, MI. This event is hosted by the Michigan State Police's (MSP) Emergency Management Homeland Security Division (EMHSD). The three day conference filled with seminars and clinics that range in topics from the latest information about known threats or hazards, to what we may be facing in the near future. These sessions were presented by nationally recognized speakers and clinicians.
- Trainings offered by Oakland County and the Michigan State Police, such as Incident Command System (ICS), National Incident Management System (NIMS) courses, and damage assessment training

As we look forward to 2019, Emergency Management continues to be one of the most important services that Bloomfield Township provides to its residents. We have begun to plan a full scale exercise for the summer of 2019 and additional planning exercises locally and with other agencies. With the uncertainty of an ever changing world, Bloomfield Township will continue to train and prepare for any potential disaster that may come our way.

HAZMAT REPORT

A hazardous material is defined as any item or agent (biological, chemical, physical) which has the potential to cause harm to humans, animals, or the environment, either by itself or through interaction with other factors.

We had many HazMat calls that were handled by our regular firefighting crews who are all trained to the operations level; which allows our firefighters to recognize a hazard and handle the call defensively. These calls were mostly made up of carbon monoxide incidents, natural gas leaks, and small fuel spills. However, some calls required a more technical response. This is where the Bloomfield Township Fire Department Hazardous Materials (HazMat) Team can be used to bring in the level of expertise needed to mitigate the incident.

All of our HazMat team members are trained to at least technician level and have many hours of specialized training above and beyond our other firefighters. Bloomfield Township has 13 hazardous materials technicians and specialists that currently make up our department HazMat team.

Throughout the year, we train with the neighboring OAKWAY community HazMat teams. During these trainings the team can stay up to date with equipment, scenarios, and best practices.

Bloomfield Township Fire Department has multiple members staffed each day to provide HAZMAT expertise and ensure the safety of Bloomfield Township and its citizens.

TECHNICAL RESCUE REPORT

Ten members of the Department are on the Technical Rescue Team (TRT). The members are trained in advanced rescue techniques and how to use specialized rescue equipment. Some of the equipment and training the members have allow them to mitigate situations such as Structural Collapse, Trench Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, Rope Rescue, Machinery Rescue, Advanced vehicle extrication techniques, swift water rescue, and submerged vehicle rescue.

All members of the TRT are members of the OAKWAY TRT and train at least four times a year with other OAKWAY Departments. Six members of the TRT are also on members of Michigan Task Force 1 (MITF-1). MITF-1 is an Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) team that consists of over 100 personnel from more than 30 Fire Departments from across the State. MITF-1 is designed to deploy a minimum of 36 personnel and associated USAR equipment anywhere, for 12 hour operational periods, and be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours.

Captain Nancarrow and Lieutenant Joe Chopski deployed for eight days with Michigan Task Force 1, as part of a twenty member Type III Water Rescue team, to North Carolina for Hurricane Florence. Working with Crains Creek Fire Department and the North Carolina National Guard, they were assigned 13 missions and rescued/evacuated 43 people.

Crews have also been busy installing smoke detectors, carbon monoxide detectors, performing home safety inspections as well as participating in neighborhood parades and subdivision social gatherings.

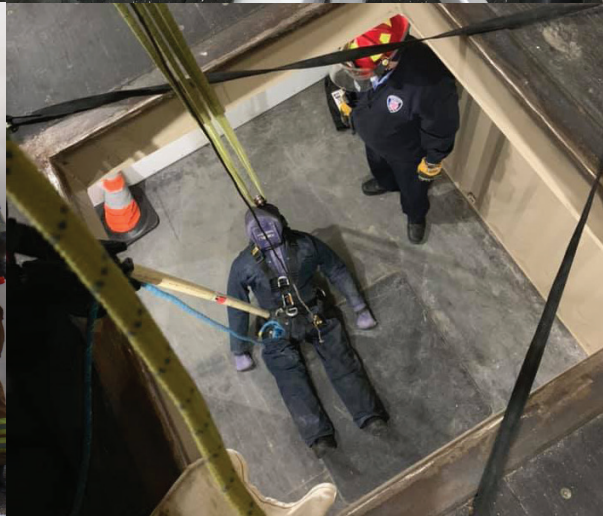

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

How do I get a copy of a Fire or Medical report?

Call the Fire Department at 248-433-7745, during our regular business hours of 7:00AM-5:30PM Monday thru Thursday, for proper procedures to obtain a report.

Who do I call to learn CPR?

You can call 248-433-7745 and ask for the EMS Coordinator.

What is a “Lock Box” & where can I obtain one?

A Lock Box is a secured locked box that is placed on the front of a building/house and contains keys to the building or residence. The fire department keeps a key that opens the Lock Box locked and secured on their vehicles. This allows the fire department easy access to a home or business even when the building may be secured, i.e. after hours or when occupants have limited mobility. Information to purchase a “Lock Box” can be obtained by calling the Bloomfield Township Fire Department at 248-433-7745.

If my Carbon Monoxide detector activates, what should I do?

Carbon Monoxide (ALSO KNOWN AS THE SILENT KILLER) is a colorless/odorless gas that is created by the incomplete combustion of carbon based fuels. It also connects to blood cells at a rate 200 times faster than oxygen. It is recommended that you install a Carbon Monoxide detector on each level of your home and if a detector activates, call 911 and leave your home. The fire department will come to your home and check the level of Carbon Monoxide (if any).

Is it legal to burn brush or tree branches in Bloomfield Township?

No, it is not legal to have any open burning in Bloomfield Township. Only approved containers (Recreational Fire Pits) are allowed. See the Township’s website for further information. www.bloomfieldtp.org

What should I do with HOT fireplace ash?

DO NOT remove hot ashes from the fireplace immediately. Wait up to 2-3 days and let the ashes cool completely in the fireplace until there are no remaining hot embers before removing them. Place cool ash in a metal container and store outside away from the home and all combustibles.

“When in Doubt, Call Us Out!” That’s what you need to remember, no matter what situation or problem may arise. When you don’t know where to turn, turn to us, your fire department. We have knowledge and resources to help solve almost any problem you may encounter, even those situations not directly related to fire or medical emergencies. Remember, we’re here to serve you, any time, any day, and in any way.
