

Letter from the Chief

I am proud to present the 2023 annual report. I would like to thank the residents, businesses, Elected Officials and Trustees for your continued support and partnership throughout the year. We would like to pay tribute to Retired Chief Don Zimmerman who passed away August 21, 2023. Chief Zimmerman served as chief from 1981-1996 and 2006-2007. He left a lasting legacy for all to model.

2023 proved to be a busy year. Bloomfield Township saw an unprecedented increase in motor vehicle thefts. In the fall, Bloomfield Township was targeted with home invasions by the South American Theft Group targeting high-end homes. This group, also known as SATG, targeted all of southeast Michigan resulting in millions of dollars in losses in jewelry, cash, purses and safes. We partnered with the Oakland County Sheriff's Office to create the Southeast Michigan Collaborate, Arrest, & Prosecute (SEMCAP) Task Force to investigate these groups. Our partnerships and assignments with the FBI's Oakland County Gang and Violent Crime Task Force, Troy Special Investigative Unit, and Oakland County Narcotics Enforcement Team allowed us to allocate additional manpower and resources to investigate these property crimes.

In the summer of 2023, we partnered with Birmingham Police Department, Rochester Police Department and Auburn Hills Police Department to host our first Youth Police Academy where graduates were introduced to aspects of policing. We continued our community engagements with Skate with a Cop, the Open House, Homeowner Association meetings, and Ice Cream Socials. Maggie was dispatched to Michigan State University to provide support and comfort after the mass shooting on the campus. In August 2023, we partnered with the Bloomfield Hills School District to host a Mass Casualty Training Event at Bloomfield Hills High School to train and test our preparedness for large scale incidents. Our Peer Support Team proved to be a valuable resource to the members of our agency.

We honored those that retired in 2023, including Detective James Moschel, Sergeant Pete Matecjik, Detective John Huizdos, Detective Cory Donberger and Officer Jon Schlabach.

We will continue to focus on our service to the community, modeling our core values of Fairness, Integrity, Pride, Respect, and Accountability.





Vehicle Lockouts: It's frustrating and we've all done it. The Bloomfield Township Police Department still assists motorists who've found themselves in this situation.



Patrol personnel are organized into four platoons, providing around-the-clock police service. While the men and women of the Patrol Division do a great job, they continuously strive to improve and deliver the best services to our community.

Bloomfield Township Police Department has two K9 teams.

K9 Vince is a drug and tracking dog. In 2023, Vince performed 15 drug searches within Bloomfield Township, 4 drug searches outside of Bloomfield Township, and 24 utility calls.

K9 Havoc is an explosive detection and tracking dog. K9 Havoc began with Bloomfield Township in 2023 and had 12 utility calls.

The K9 teams are available for community engagement, in 2023 they combined for 17 demonstrations.

Bloomfield Village Police

The Bloomfield Village Police Station is located at 3595 Bradway Blvd. in Bloomfield Village, MI. Bloomfield Village Police Officers may be contacted by calling the dispatch at 248-433-7755, or in an emergency, 911.

The Bloomfield Village Police Department is funded through a special assessment on Bloomfield Village residents. Village police officers are sworn law enforcement officers under authority of the Bloomfield Township Police Department.

The Bloomfield Village Police Department is a directed patrol unit of the Bloomfield Township Police Department. The Bloomfield Village Association contracts with Bloomfield Township Police to hire experienced Police Officers. These officers are then assigned to patrol areas within Bloomfield Village.

Investigations

The mission of the Investigations Division is to identify, target, arrest and successfully prosecute individuals involved in criminal activity as well as recover stolen property. The Investigations Division is managed by a lieutenant and a sergeant who oversee the investigations, assigns cases and handle the day-to-day operations. There are five Detectives in the Investigations Division as well as two School Liaison Officers.

The Detectives establish and maintain liaisons with other law enforcement agencies, State and District Attorney's Offices as well as the local State and District courts. The Detectives participate in all forms of investigative activities including conducting surveillance, obtaining and serving arrest warrants, search warrants, probation and parole searches. Detectives also monitor and verify compliance with registered sex offenders.

Detectives are carefully selected for the Investigations Division based on experience, work ethic, and the ability to conduct in-depth criminal investigations. They investigate complex and demanding cases, which could take months, sometimes years, to fully investigate. Our Detectives develop an advanced level of expertise by attending specialized training and working complex cases with colleagues at the local, state, and federal levels.

Task force officers learn how to gather information and build cases. In the course of their investigations, task force agents / officers prepare various types of warrants, conduct surveillance, make arrests, interview suspects and witnesses, and execute search warrants.

After completing their tour with the task force, our officers return to their patrol duties with experience and investigative insight that few in law enforcement will ever have. Further, they have discovered the enormous resources available to local law enforcement agencies like the Bloomfield Township Police Department, resources that can all be used to better serve and protect the community.

Bloomfield Township has members in the Troy Special Investigations Unit (SIU): a task force of police officers from Bloomfield Township, Troy, Auburn Hills, Royal Oak, and Birmingham that focuses on crimes committed within these communities, the Oakland County Sherriff's Narcotic Enforcement Team (N.E.T.) who investigate drug crimes, the FBI Violent Crimes and Gang Task Force who investigate federal crimes including robberies, conspiracy, and crime rings, and the FBI Identity Theft and Fraud Task Force that investigate fraud-related crimes.


Bloomfield Township's 911 Dispatch Center, also known as a Public Safety Access Point (PSAP), receives incoming emergency and non-emergency phone calls and dispatches the appropriate services to that location (police, fire, and EMS).

The center is equipped with the latest emergency telecommunications technology, including Enhanced 9-1-1 and Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD). Together, the location and phone number of a caller is displayed on a map, as well as fire and police assets. This assures the most efficient delivery of services.

Dispatch operates 24 hours a day and consists of 12 Dispatchers distributed over 4 shifts and 1 Dispatch Supervisor. All communications personnel receive extensive training related to emergency and non-emergency operations. Bloomfield Township dispatches Fire, Bloomfield Township Police, and Franklin Village Police.

In addition to their duties, dispatchers also monitor the radio traffic of several agencies, including the Michigan State Police, Oakland County Sheriff, and area fire departments. Dispatchers also send and receive information through the Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN) and the National Crime Information Communications (NCIC) network.

Property and Records

The Evidence/Property Clerk is required to follow state and federal statutes and strives to be in compliance with Michigan and National law enforcement practices in the evidence/property guidelines. Due to frequent changes in the laws, policies and procedures are updated in these practices frequently. It is the responsibility of the Evidence/Property Clerk to stay current on evolving trends in legal processes involving evidence and property.

The Records Division handles much more than just reports. In addition to processing Freedom of Information Act (F.O.I.A.) requests, the Records Division has several other responsibilities. FOIA requests can now be made through the Township's Records Portal at www.bloomfieldtwp.org and clicking "Records Request".

The Records Division also works closely with the Detective Bureau to ensure registered sex offenders are in compliance with the MI Sex Offender Registry.

Amongst all those duties, they also issue and record handgun registrations.




